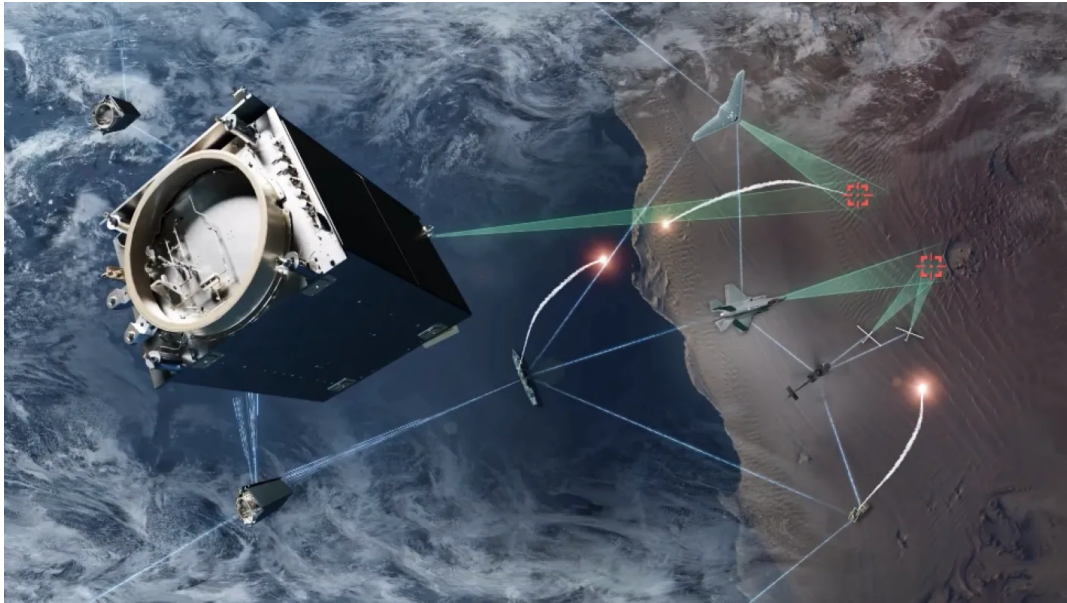




Defense & Space: Without a Sovereign Satellite Chain, the European DOME Risks Remaining an Illusion.
