The great innovation of these tools is their flexibility: if the enemy attempts to jam a specific frequency, the radio automatically switches channel or signal type in a fraction of a second, without interrupting the flow of information.

Today a military operation works exactly like an ultra-fast and protected internet network:

1. A drone spots a danger or target.
2. It transmits the data in real time to command and ground troops via satellite or radio.
3. The response is coordinated instantly to neutralize the threat.

For this reason, the priority of modern defense industries is to create "anti-jamming" networks, capable of resisting attacks and continuing to function even in the most critical situations.
