



Operation Epic Fury: The Tomahawk Rain and the New War of Attrition in the Middle East

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Operation Epic Fury marked an unprecedented turning point in the **doctrine of long-range bombing**. In the past 48 hours, Pentagon sources have confirmed that the volume of fire has reached heights unseen since the Gulf War: over **850 Tomahawk cruise missiles** have been launched against strategic targets in response to the escalation of regional tensions. 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The Asymmetric Response: US Bases Under Siege

The precision of these strikes suggests a qualitative leap in adversary tactical intelligence, capable of identifying the weak points of "forward-deployed" bases. Particularly concerning is the effectiveness of swarm attack systems, which have severely tested point defenses (CIWS) and Patriot systems. This scenario is pushing Central Command (CENTCOM) to request an **immediate reinforcement of electronic warfare capabilities** and the deployment of an additional 10,000 units to ensure the security of installation perimeters, while support logistics must now operate under a constant threat of interception.

The Revolution of "Factories in Containers"

In this emergency climate, a technological solution emerges that could radically change logistical support at the front: **portable interceptor factories**. Faced with the **need to produce defense drones and anti-UAV munitions in record time**, several defense sector startups are testing **integrated production lines within standard shipping containers**.

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The idea is to be able to ship a "factory in a box" **directly to operational theaters or rear bases**, reducing transoceanic transport times to zero. **These automated plants, powered by artificial intelligence for quality control, are capable of assembling hundreds of small interceptor drones per day from pre-printed components**. It is a direct response to the need to counter the waves of low-cost drones that are saturating traditional defenses. If the test

is successful, the ability to generate "on-site" firepower will become the new standard of modern defense, transforming the industrial infrastructure itself into a flexible and hard-to-neutralize tactical weapon.
