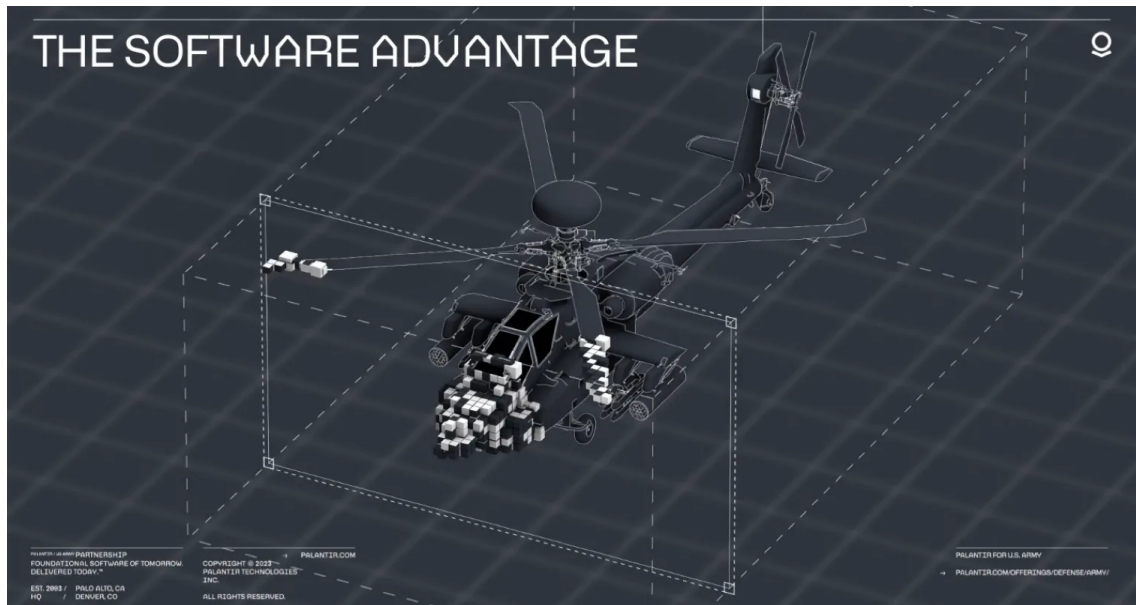




The Technological Republic: Palantir's Manifesto for Defense
