



The Turkey-Arabia-Pakistan Axis Challenges Tehran: A Mutual Defense Pact in Article 5 Style

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The **signing of the mutual defense agreement** in Mecca between **Saudi Arabia, Turkey, and Pakistan** — a pact that echoes the spirit of **NATO's Article 5** — represents a **masterpiece of geopolitical diplomacy**, with **Ankara** skillfully positioning itself at the center of the **new security architecture** of the Sunni world. Exploiting **regional insecurities** and the common fear of isolation in a **blazing Middle Eastern quadrant**, **Turkey** has managed to unite around its own **national interests** three powers with highly complementary profiles. The brilliance of the move lies in **Ankara's ability** to extract from each partner exactly the **useful advantages** to expand its own **sphere of action** without facing **limiting constraints**. On one hand, the axis with **Saudi Arabia** guarantees a **fundamental economic boost** and direct access to **energy flows** and investments at a time of global crisis. On the other hand, the bond with **Pakistan** and the military leadership of Islamabad secures a **deep military cooperation** (already tested with operational feedback on Saudi territory) that projects **Turkey** well beyond traditional boundaries, reaching **South Asia**. All this occurs while maintaining existing **international commitments**, confirming a **diplomatic flexibility** that allows it to negotiate from a **position of strength** with Washington and other superpowers.

The reaction of Tehran and the new regional chessboard

Naturally, a move of such magnitude could not fail to provoke the immediate and sharp **reaction of Tehran**. Iranian authorities dismissed the agreement as a mere **“piece of paper”**, warning Riyadh of the risks of relying on external powers and attempting to downplay the significance of the **Sunni axis**. However, against the backdrop of complex security negotiations in the **Strait of Hormuz** and the standoff with the United States over **sanctions** and oil revenues, the reality on the ground is quite different. Thanks to this pact, **Turkey** permanently consolidates its role as a **leading power** and **balance point**, capable of influencing **energy and military dossiers** from the Mediterranean to the **Persian Gulf**.
