



USA: Special Forces and DIA Outline 6 Technological Priorities for Machine-Speed Intelligence

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During the **DoDIIS Worldwide** conference held in Tampa, Florida, the leaders of the *Defense Intelligence Agency* (DIA) and the *US Special Operations Command* (SOCOM) issued a strong call for innovation. The goal is to drastically accelerate data sharing and processing to counter evolving global threats, overcoming bureaucratic sluggishness and adopting cutting-edge commercial technologies.

The CIO of the DIA, **Edacheril Mathew**, opened the proceedings by emphasizing that speed, scale, and technological adoption are changing radically: *"If we do not adopt commercial technologies at the speed of innovation, we will head towards obsolescence"*.

The 6 Technological Priorities Required by the Industry

The director of the DIA, Lieutenant General **James Adams**, highlighted how intelligence is facing an unprecedented volume of data, in a context where strategic competitors use pressure campaigns, economic coercion, and information manipulation to slow down the U.S. decision-making advantage.

To keep pace, Adams identified **six key capabilities** that the DIA requires from industrial and governmental partners:

- **1. Automation of Open-Source Intelligence (OSINT):** Systems capable of automatically sorting, validating, and connecting information, flagging when commercial satellite images, social media, and shipping data converge on the same narrative.
- **2. True Intelligence Convergence:** Real interoperability based on a common language and shared metadata standards.
- **3. Mature Implementation of Zero Trust:** Rigorous security architectures based on the “zero trust” principle.
- **4. Integrated Security as-a-Service:** Identity management, encryption, monitoring, and access control solutions delivered as cloud-native services accessible by enterprise members, partners, and allies.
- **5. Virtual SCIFs:** Cloud-enabled secure environments capable of offering the same level of assurance as a physical *Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility*, accessible from multiple authorized locations.
- **6. Enhancement of JWICS:** Improvements to the *Joint Worldwide Intelligence Communications System* to introduce automation and operational efficiency without compromising security levels.

Towards a Unified Ecosystem and the Post-Quantum Challenge

Reinforcing the need for cooperation, SOCOM Commander Admiral **Frank Bradley** emphasized that special forces never fight alone and require an integrated ecosystem that unites allied forces, interagency partners, and the technology sector. Bradley called for overcoming the traditional “*speed of bureaucracy*” associated with accreditations to move to a cohesive team model.

Finally, CIO Edacheril Mathew issued a crucial warning in anticipation of the quantum era (“Q-Day”):

“If there is one thing to remember from this message: we must reach post-quantum encryption. Our way of life depends on it. This is our digital Enigma moment; democracy and freedom are at stake.”

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
